WHAT'S NEW IN AVP

AVP International ConferenceLabor Day Weekend in Maryland

The second AVP International Conference is scheduled for the Labor Day Weekend in 1992 and will be held in Maryland. This will be a bigger and better three day conference as AVPers around the country have requested. We expect AVP leaders from around the world to attend.

This conference will include learning new exercises, sharing of tips and ideas for trainers, coordinators and area leaders. One day will be devoted to mini-workshops which will will cover everything from fundraising to the new Training for Trainers Curriculum. It will also be the kickoff event for the new National AVP Organization.

On the second day, We will focus on diversity and an organizational development workshop. This will help local AVP groups deal with their organizational problems and help with the national structure.

The good news is that the cost of this three day conference will be about the same as the two day conference held in 1990. We also plan to have a travel pool t equalize the travel costs for all participants.

The conference will be held at Skycroft Conference Center in Middletown, Maryland about 60 miles north of Washington, D.C.

The conference center is situated on the top of 1,100 foot South Mountain with a spectacular view of the woods and rolling sills of the rural Maryland countryside.

Skycroft has comfortable, airconditioned, motel style rooms that will accommodate 64 people in double occupancy. The Maryland AVP group has made the arrangements and has generously agreed to serve as hosts for the conference.

For those in New York State that may think this is a long way to travel for a conference, Middletown, Maryland is closer to New York City than Rochester, New York and it is about the same distance from Buffalo, New York to Middletown, Maryland as it is from Buffalo to New York City.

So keep Labor Day free in 1992 and register for this exciting conference. Enclosed is a registration form and since we only have 64 airconditioned rooms reserved, it is wise to register early. There is a special discount for early registration.

If there are special topics you would like to see covered, please list them on your registration form. If you would like to lead a workshop on a special topic, please include that information also.

Planting the Seeds of Change Around the Globe

It has been a exceptional year for the expansion of AVP as Steve Angell has traveled around the globe planting the seeds of AVP. His journey in 1991 included 16 countries and 28 states. He brought the AVP message to police officers and ex-guerillas in Colombia, Protestants and Catholics in Northern Ireland, and corrections officers in New Zealand, as well as well as leading prison workshops in Canada, England, California and Virginia.

Colombia is one of the most violent countries in the world with people shot in cold blood daily, family members of judges and prominent officials are kidnaped and killed. Police "clean up" neighborhoods by shooting suspected or known criminals.

An AVP community workshop in Bogota, Colombia was attended by a remarkably diverse group including a police lieutenant, prison guards, a prison administrator, social workers, a judge, an ex-inmate and an exguerilla. The group saw the AVP program as "A seed that can be planted to bring about change."

After an AVP workshop at Pentonville Prison in London, an inmate wrote to the First Governor (Warden) as follows: "Miracles do not happen overnight and it would be folly to suggest that none of the inmates attending this course will ever again think or act violently. However, it is a fact that all those who did attend over those two days learned not only a good deal about themselves and

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their motives, but were also fortunate enough to be introduced to the 'Transforming Power' which enables people to act for the purpose of good rather than evil."

In both Australia and New Zealand, the AVP program was greeted with enthusiasm. With the help of local facilitators, Steve conducted Basic Community Workshops in both countries. The workshops included a significant number of prison staff. After his return, Steve received a letter from Australia which said "We realize there are many skills to be mastered, but with the willingness from a sufficent number of people, we can make AVP happen here in Queensland." All the Friends meetings in New Zealand have eagerly approved getting into the AVP project. On January 1, Steve left for a second trip to Australia and New Zealand. He will be spending a month in each country training leaders.

WHAT'S NEW IN AVP

Help!!! Coordinators Needed

A coordinator is needed for both Green Haven and Fishkill Prisons if the AVP program is to continue. There are long waiting lists for AVP at both facilities.

Green Haven Prison, east of Poughkeepsie, is the birthplace AVP and it has a strong group of inside facilitators to carry on the program. Veronique Doumbe is retiring as coordinator since she is about to have a baby. However, she has already set up a schedule of 24 workshops for 1992, so part of the work has been done for the new coordinator.

Fishkill Prison, near Beacon, New York, has also had an outstanding AVP program for years which is supported many experienced inside facilitators. Mike Grunebaum is retiring as coordinator because of other commitments in his life. He has arranged a schedule of 21 workshops for 1992 and has already invited all trainers who led workshops at Fishkill in 1991 to sign up for 1992.

Any trainer living in the Hudson Valley, Westchester or Fairfield Counties would be within reach of these facilities. Coordinating the program involves organizing training teams and writing to prison administrators

to schedule workshops. It is not necessary to be a Lead Trainer to handle this task. A little organizational skill is all that is required. Taking on this job would be a great gift to AVP and the prison inmates.

AVP West Expands in California & Alaska

Womens Prison in Alaska

The Alaska AVP group which calls itself Hands of Peace held its first workshop in a womens prison at Meadow Creek Prison near Anchorage. Regular workshops continue at the Fairbanks Correctional Center and a workshop was held at Higland Mountain facility. The Alaska AVP group is also interested in working with teenagers. They have provided a Basic Workshop for dyslexic youth and have scheduled a workshop for teenage dropouts.


San Quentin

An AVP group has been organized in the Bay Area and they now have two lead trainers and other talented facilitators who will soon be capable of serving as lead trainers. They are now providing monthly workshops at San Quentin Prison as well as conducting more community workshops to train leaders.

Donavan

The San Diego AVP group begins its third year at the giant Donavan Prison with 17,000 inmates. Two workshops are held each month and a third is scheduled when possible. In addition, support groups are held three times a month. This ambitious program is only possible because of a group of exceptionally dedicated facilitators both inside and outside of prison as well as a mutually respectful relationship with inmates and staff.

AVP West now has 61 trained outside facilitators and approximately 60 inside facilitators. It has three well established



regional groups and has started community workshops in the Los Angeles/Santa Barbara area. AVP West looks forward to a year of further expansion and growth in

1992.

A Wink to the Wise

An AVP Trainer at Green Correctional Facility near Albany, New York was in the yard recently when he observed a fight developing. Green is a facility with many youthful offenders and has a reputation for frequent violent incidents. The fight had been initiated when one inmate insulted the other person's mother.

The trainer noticed that the person that made the insult had been in his workshop the previous weekend. He then caught the inmate's eye and winked at him. This was enough to help the inmate remember his AVP training. the inmate then apologized for the insult and walked away. Something as small as a wink can lead to Transforming Power.

On Women Volunteers and Convicts

I've been thinking for a long time about the contribution I have to make to the collective light surrounding the relationships between women volunteers and convicts. The recent article by Chris Malmgreen in "the Transformer", July-August-September, 1991 helped me to bring clarity to my thoughts. for me, clarity comes from spiritual-based reflection. That is the basis for the "Gathering of Women Friends in Prison" section of the AVP Basic Manual. That is why "Gathering..." provides us such rich material an infinite possibilities to assess our own experience, rather than simple answers.

When I began doing prison work, I was often asked "Why?" The truth was that I fgelt a strong spiritual leading to prison work. "Why", I could not answer. I met Ken, a convict in my first workshop. As the months passed, it became clear to me that my leading was, indeed, to a life's commitment to a relationship with Ken and to continue my prison witness with him. I was terrified and fought the leading with logic and reason, reading the "Gathering..." pages daily — fighting with God and the truth Spirit had revealed to me. Ultimately, however, my commitment is to leading a spirit-led life and that leading was clear to me. Once again, I had been called to go where angels and I, alike, feared to tread!

Ken and I were married in prison "after the manner of Friends," using the Quaker clearness process to test the clarity of our leading to marry. Our clearness committee was made up of Friends from "outside", including one longterm AVP facilitator, and one Quaker convict from "inside," also and AVP facilitator. At that time, Ken had a life sentence with no set parole date.

Ken is home now. He was released on Thanksgiving, 1990. His reentry to the outside world after 13 1/2 years of incarceration and growing up in the juvenile system has been difficult at times. We ofter wonder how others without love and support survive. It is easy to see why they frequently don't. I won't say it's been easy, byt then what relationship is? The foundation, though, of our relationship comes from God and we both know this is our greatest challenge and our greatest gift from Spirit.

Robert Martin's article in the Jan-Feb-Mar, 1991 issue of "the Transformer," raises the concern that forming a relationship with a single inmate removes one from the larger witness to many inmates and undermines the program as a whole. It has been my experience that God does indeed move in mysterious ways. And that it is my responsibility to be open and responsive to God's leadings in my life, trusting that God will open the way for our continued witness.

Ken is also an AVP facilitator and we have continued to lead workshops training new facilitators in the community. As a team, we offer something unique and special. We are working with the probation/parole office to Continued on next page

offer ongoing support groups, teaching communication skills, in a pilot project in this state. We are awaiting the new materials for sharing AVP with teens. The local juvenile drug/alcohol drug treatment facility and the juvenile detention center are both eager for our program. We are even hoping to return as a couple to the adult prison system to lead workshops. Prison witness is a lifelong commitment to us. And our contributions are no less profound than had we continued to lead AVP workshops separately in the prison system.

I am deeply sorry for the pain I hear in the relationships Robert has seen between prisoners and volunteers. It is important not to deny these possibilities. Just as it is important that we be aware os some of the dynamics and generalizations presented in the "Gathering..." However, it is central to AVP that we respect the humanity in each individual equally, without prejudice, wothout stereotyping, speaking always to that of God (the humanity) in others. Speaking to that of God in others means being open to unprecedented beauty and possibility. If we teach this in AVP, yet ate unwilling to practice it in our lives, the truth of our actions will speak louder than our words.

In my life the power in transforming power is spiritually defined. When that power moves in my life, whether it is in a conflictual situation or otherwise, I try to listen and be open to its direction. I trust that that power (which I choose to call God or Spirit) will open a path for all my true

leadings. As a community, we must not allow the prison system and its sometimes inhumane restrictions come between us and our true leadings. Paths for change in the prison system will also open for those leadings, perhaps on God's timetable rather than our own. Likewise, we must not stand in the way of true leadings among us. Rather, we must assist each other in coming to clarity as to the direction that power is leading each of us. It is imperative that we neither judge or restrict each other from following to which we are each uniquely led. It is the diversity of our collective experiences and leadings that bring about the true beauty of life and the profound nature of our witness.

May we all walk in beauty,

How AVP Has Helped Me...

"AVP has helped in a lot of areas in my life. Right now it is helping with the emotional violence inside of me."

"It has helped me with my parents — a lot!"

"The violence in my life is mostly verbal and self-directed. Sometimes it is silent... I think the thing I got hold of here this weekend is that I must be more assertive in overcoming my passivity and procrastination."

"It taught me that everybody has feelings."

AVP and Self Image

We live our self-image. Our self-image is in both the consciousand the unconscious mind. Our self-image is formed from many life experiences reaching back into our earliest childhood. Our self-image is who we think we are, what we think we can do and can't do, our aspirations for ourselves or lack thereof, how we compare ourselves to other people, how we think other people see us and how we see ourselves in relation to the total process of Creation.

When children are abused this is a contributing factor to the formation of their self-image. Praise or put downs from people we trust or admire help to form our self-image. How our peers treat us, how we feel about our bodies, our successes and failures all contribute to our self-image. The role models in our lives play an important part in helping to form our self-image. Everybody has a self-image and this selfimage is constantly open to being changed or altered by new experiences. Self-image is not self-esteem, the latter being the feelings we have about who we are, what we are and what we do or don't do.

In AVP, we are very much involved in getting people to redefine themselves because negative images tend to produce negative behavior. Someone who has the self-image that other people are out to get him/her is apt to treat others with hostility or suspicion or to withdraw. A person who sees the world as owing him/her a living is likely to be very dependent on others and show little initiative. If someone has the self-image of being macho, he is likely to be very aggressive, particularly in situations where he feels he is under attack.

Consequently in AVP, we start immediately to try and get individuals to define themselves in positive terms. In the adjective name exercise, we have them select a positive adjective to put with their name and we have them use it frequently in identifying self and have others use it in addressing them. We have a ground rule of "no put-downs". And we do the affirmation exercise where they have say only things they like about themselves. Throughout the workshop we emphasize affirmation of one another.

How often have we heard participants say that in the workshop they learned that there are many similarities amongst us. When someone is thinking they are different from others because only they have faced certain difficulties in life, this is part of their selfimage. When they find that others have had similar experiences, it can help alter and soften the negativity this experience may have contributed to their self-image. The concentric circles exercise can be very helpful in dispelling some of the notions of being different from others.

The "Sharing a conflict I solved nonviolently" exercise also can contribute to assisting people see 1) that they have had a successful experience in resolving conflict without violence and 2) getting a feeeling for the commonality in life's experiences. The Empathy exercise also can have a powerful impact in this regard. While the concept of Transforming Power may be difficult to grasp at first, once someone grasps it, it has a very empowering effect because they realize, perhaps for the first time, that they have this creative power to call upon.

The emphasis in AVP on empowerment, is in itself a self-image changing force in that indiviuals begin to see that they can indeed do something about aspects of their lives which heretofore they viewed as unchangeable. Empowerment is emphasized in many ways:

1) Letting participants know that the workshop belongs to them and reenforcing this by regular evaluations and, as possible, responding to the suggestions they bring up in the evaluations.

2) Maintaining a separation between the workshops and the prison system so that they can indeed feel the ownership.

3) Having inmates as facilitators working with those who come in from the outside on an equality basis.

4) Having the facilitators participating in exercises along with everyone else and stressing the point that we are all learners and all teachers of one another.

5) And finally the experiential learning process itself which demonstrates that collectively we can teach ourselves.

The "Who Am I" exercise can be a powerful integrating experience drawing together for the individual many of his/her self images and viewing these in relation to things that have been learned in the workshop. Particularly helpful in this regard is having participants prioritize their self-images and at the end of the exercise consider whether they would change the order in any way. In all these many ways we are helping participants to redefine themselves and hopefully to change negative self-images into positive ones and in so doing to find different and more satisfying ways of living their lives.

AVP in D.C.

New mayor, Sharon Pratt Kelly, has made a commitment to dealing with the problem of violence in Washington, D.C. As part of this effort, the Department of Corrections is seeking to offer the AVP program in every one of it's seven prisons.

The first workshop was recently held in a Washington D.C. prison and community workshops are being organized to train outside facilitators. A special effort is being made to recruit African-American leaders.

Seventeen participants recently attended a Basic Community Workshop sponsored by a Black church in D.C. Most of the participants want to become become facilitators. The workshop was led by Lee Stern, Carletta Allen and Richard Cunningham, and Lee Stern was the only white face in the workshop.

The Maryland AVP group is planning another Basic Workshop in February followed by a Training for Trainers shortly thereafter.

AVP Reaches Two New Prisons In Northern New York

Some exciting things are happening in the Northern Tier of New York. Through the hard work and dedicated effort of John Blanchard, AVP has begun at two of the ten prisons that requested the program. Recently, the first two workshops were held at Gouvenor Correctional Facility and two workshops are scheduled for January 15 to 17 at Ogdensburg Correctional Facility. The next prison where they plan to introduce the program is Malone. The regualar AVP

program is continuing at Watertown Correctional Facility.

The Watertown group is also organizing community workshops in nearby towns and a Catholic Sister who trains people in lay ministry is helping to guide them to become AVP trainers.
